STUDENT EVENTS AT THE ANNUAL MEETING

The Graduate Student Committee (GSC) is excited to offer a wide range of programs exclusively for graduate students at this year's Annual AAR/SBL Meeting in San Diego. Headlining this weekend of events is the Special Topics Forum on **Saturday from 1:00–3:30pm**. This year's forum is titled Graduate Trainingand Scholarly Formation and will consider such timely questions as: Are scholars in the academic study of religion "well trained"? For what are students being trained? Through which avenues does scholarly formation take place? How does graduate training shape scholarly identity and career options? How do mentoring relationships factor into graduate training? These concerns relate to the larger task of how we might reenvision the relationship of graduate training to the rest of the academy and how a critical reevaluation of our current practices of scholarly formation could be used shape the future of our discipline. Panelists include Thomas Tweed, David Harrington Watt, Kathryn Lofton, Vasudha Narayanan, Deborah Creamer, and Jeff Wilson. We hope that you will join us for what promises to be a lively and insightful conversation.

Throughout the weekend the GSC will also be hosting a eries of Student Lounge Roundtables. These roundtables were a great success last year, and we had far more proposals this year than we could fit into the time frame of the conference. This year we are excited to offer eighteen different sessions between Saturday morning and Monday afternoon. Four sessions will address various creative ways to find alternative employment outside of academia. A group of three sessions will consider topics related to striking a healthy balance between work and life as a graduate student, including approaches to time management, how to balance family life with the demands of research and writing, and healthy eating amidst all the stresses of graduate life. On a related note, three roundtables will discuss specific approaches to effective time management and organizational skills to help graduate students prepare for and complete major research projects. A series of four roundtables will help graduate students navigate their transformation from student to educator by providing tools for effective teaching, designing a successful college course, and teaching with technology. Other roundtables will address topics such as how to secure funding for your research, how to engage the public in your research and teaching, and the role of the mentor in graduate student formation.

The roundtable sessions are not only great opportunities for graduate students to further their professional development in a friendly atmosphere, these sessions also help build a strong community at the annual meeting, which can sometimes be a bit overwhelming. To help build this community, the GSC has secured a Graduate Student Lounge that will be open for the duration of the conference. All of the roundtables will take place in this lounge but please feel free to use the lounge as a place to rest between panels and as a place to meet new colleagues and make new friends. Refreshments will bemade available. The Graduate Student Committee hopes that you have a wonderful and rewarding experience at this year's Annual Meeting and that you make the GSC-sponsored events part of your weekend! See you there!
