2012 CALL FOR PAPERS

We would like to update you on the status of our online proposal submission system for the 2012 Chicago Annual Meeting.

Over the past six months, we've been working steadily with a software development firm on improving our online systems. Though that work is rapidly reaching completion, it will delay the launch of the proposal submission system to the end of the month. We apologize for the delay, but feel it essential for providing you the best system possible.

Unfortunately, this means we need to shorten the time window for submitting proposals to about two weeks, because of other program planning activities that subsequently need to occur to publish the online Program Book in a timely manner.

With that in mind, we encourage you to go ahead and begin preparing your Annual Meeting proposals offline—identifying the Program Units you'd like to submit your proposals to and the presenters involved, and drafting your proposal descriptions (max 1500 words) and abstracts (max 150 words). That way, you'll be prepared to copy and paste that information once the system is ready. For further information on preparing your proposal, please see the <u>Call for Papers</u>.

Our staff is working in overdrive on this to provide you the proposal submission system as soon as possible. We are happy to respond to any questions or comments you have, and will certainly keep you posted.

Regional Development Grants provide funds for special projects within the regions that promise to benefit the scholarly and professional life of AAR members and do the work of the AAR in the regions. Workshops, special programs, training events, and other innovative regional projects may be funded through this source. Where possible, projects are designed so that they may be duplicated or transported to other regions.

Applications should include a narrative description of the project detailing how the project promises to benefit the scholarly and professional life of AAR members and the work of the region. Please include comments on how these projects or activities may be adapted to other regional groups. The application should state the time period covered by the project and provide a detailed budget (office expenses, travel expenses, honoraria, stipend, and other expenses). Institutional overhead costs should not be included in this budget. No grant will exceed \$4,000.
