JAAR Media Reviews: Call for Submissions

Since 2012, the Journal of the American Academy of Religion has included brief review essays (about 5,000 words) on topics related to media and its place in the study of religion. These are decidedly not reviews of individual films, television shows, video games, music, etc., nor straightforward interpretations of them as formal texts. Rather, we are interested in the following nonexclusive,

sometimes overlapping, topics.

- A recurring trope or theme that appears across a number of recent works. This may function as an overview of a few recent releases that arguably center on a certain issue, thus reflecting and reinforcing a general cultural trend.
- How and why particular work enters a broader cultural milieu (including social—economic—political dimensions), and what that tells us about our relations to religion in and through popular culture.
- An overview of a particular auteur, especially one who is still producing pertinent work, and the relevance of their work for the study of religion.
- Pedagogical implications. Reviews that show how and why media can be used in Religious Studies classrooms.

Any and all of these will clearly demonstrate the relation of the topic to the academic study of religion. For further information about these review essays, or to submit a review essay, please contact <u>John Lyden</u>, <u>johnclyden@gmail.com</u>.

During his panel, President Carter will answer questions about his efforts to address climate change both during and after his administration, and his latest book, *A Call to Action: Women*, <u>Registration</u>



Release of PRRI/AAR National Survey on Religion, Values, and Climate Change (A22-145) - Saturday, November 22



What do Americans think about climate change, and how do religious and moral

beliefs impact their opinions about science, human responsibility, and environmental policies? This panel will feature the release of a new national public opinion survey, conducted by Public Religion Research Institute (PRRI) in collaboration with the AAR. The survey of 3,000 Americans is one of the largest surveys on religion and climate change ever conducted.


The survey explores a range of topics, including Americans' belief or skepticism about the reality of climate change; the roles that partisanship, religion, and media consumption play in the development of those views; whether Americans see climate change as a manageable problem or an imminent crisis; how committed Millennials are to the issue of climate change; and how important policies that address climate change are to different religious groups.

The National Endowment for the Humanities offers grants to scholars and others engaged in humanistic research and teaching. Twenty-six grant programs support individuals, teams, and institutions doing work for other scholars, students, or the general public. Fundable projects include research for monographs, scholarly editions, creating or revising a class, preserving or digitizing archival collections, professional development for teachers, museum exhibits and documentaries. The NEH has a long record of supporting important scholarship in religious studies, including a variety of disciplinary approaches and religious traditions.
