

In Memoriam: Robert V. Smith, 1920–2015

Robert Virgil "R. V." Smith, the Harry Emerson Fosdick Professor of Philosophy and Religion, Emeritus, at Colgate University, passed away on February 12, 2015, at the age of 94. Dr. Smith, a lifetime member of the AAR, was chairman of the 1963 Self-Study Committee of

the National Association of Biblical Instructors (NABI), which recommended the transformation of NABI into the American

Academy of Religion, a transition that took place in 1964. In 2002, the Executive Committee of the AAR awarded Dr. Smith the prestigious Ray L. In Memoriam: Karen McCarthy Brown

Karen McCarthy Brown, professor emerita of anthropology and sociology at Drew University, passed away on March 4, 2015. Dr. Brown was a longtime AAR member and a plenary speaker at the 2006 AAR Annual Meeting. She was best

known for her book *Mama Lola: A Vodou Priestess in Brooklyn*, which examined Haitian diasporic religions, particularly Voudou.
