The American Academy of Religion announces the continuation of a program to assist in the mentoring of underrepresented groups. The program is an initiative of the four standing committees of the AAR:



- Status of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Intersex, & Queer Persons in the Profession (LGBTIQ)
- Status of People with Disabilities in the Profession (PWD)
- Status of Racial and Ethnic Minorities in the Profession (REM)
- Status of Women in the Profession (SWP)

Thirty-five applicants will be matched with participating scholars who will serve as mentors for a period of one year.

The deadline for mentoring applications is **May 15, 2016**. Notification of program acceptance will be sent by **June 1, 2016**.



MEMBER NOTES In Memoriam



Nikki Bado, Iowa State University Nikki passed away on April 22, 2016. She was an associate professor at Iowa State University. She wrote on Paganism, religion in popular culture, Japanese religious festivals, the body in religion,

ritual and play, and pilgrimage. Her book, Coming to the Edge of the Circle: A Wiccan Initiation Ritual, was published as part of the AAR Academy Series. Nikki was a very active member of the AAR; she was serving on the AAR Status of Persons with Disabilities Committee and in the Body and Religion Group's steering committee at the time of her death. She also served with the Women and Religion Section; Anthropology of Religion Group; Ritual Studies Group; and was fundamental in the establishment of the Contemporary Pagan Studies Group.
