In Memoriam: Former AAR Executive Director, Jim Wiggins, 1935–2017



James B. Wiggins, Eliphalet Remington Professor of Religion Emeritus, Syracuse University, passed away on February 20, 2017, at the age of 81. Dr. Wiggins earned the PhD from Drew University in 1963 and joined the faculty at Syracuse University the same year. At Syracuse, he served as director of graduate studies in

religion from 1975 to 1980 and as chair of the department from 1980 to 2000. He retired in 2001. His research and writings were in the field of Western religion and culture, and his publications include *Foundations of Christianity* (1972), *Religion as Story* (1975), *Christianity: A Cultural Approach* (1987), and *In Praise of Religious Diversity* (1996). He was an ordained minister of the United Methodist Church.







In Memoriam

Kathleen Erndl (1954–2017), Florida State University



Kathleen M. Erndl, Associate Professor, Department of Religion, Florida State University, died on February 19, 2017, at the age of 63. Dr. Erndl earned her PhD

in South Asian religions from the University of Wisconsin in 1987. Her areas of research included Hindu goddesses and Indian cinema and religion. She was the author of *Victory to the Mother: The Hindu Goddess of Northwest India in Myth, Ritual, and Symbol* (1993) and coeditor of *Is the Goddess a Feminist?: The Politics of South Asian Goddesses* (2001). An active volunteer with the AAR for many years, she was serving on the steering committee of the Arts, Literature, and Religion program unit at the time of her death. Peter Foley (1961–2016), University of Arizona

Peter W. Foley, Associate Professor in the Department of Religious Studies & Classics at the University of Arizona, died on December 13, 2016, at the age of 55.

He earned the DPhil from the University of Vienna in 1990, and joined the faculty at the University of Arizona in 1992. He was the founding director of the Institute for the Study of Religion and Culture at UA. Dr. Foley's work focused on the history of ideas in philosophy and theological thought. He published books on Adam Müller (1990) and Friedrich Schleiermacher (2006). More information about Dr. Foley's life and work may be found here on the UA website.



Charles Reynolds (1938–2017), University of Tennessee, Knoxville

Charles Harlan Reynolds, Professor Emeritus, University of Tennessee, Knoxville, passed away

on January 25, 2017, at the age of 78. Dr. Reynolds, a longtime member of the AAR, earned his PhD in religious studies from Harvard University in 1968. He joined the University of Tennessee, Knoxville religious studies department in 1969, where he served as head of the department for 21 years. He retired in 2009. Dr. Reynolds was known for his activism for justice and his dedication to the university. A highly respected teacher and scholar, he was the founding editor of the *Journal of Religious Ethics*.
